
SI Anglesey

The outline map of Anglesey was chosen as this is depicted on our Insignia.

Anglesey or Ynys Mon in Welsh was known as Mam Cymru (Mother of Wales) during the middle ages because of its fertile fields which formed the breadbasket for the north of Wales. There were 49 windmills.



The Daffodil is the emblem of Wales and marks St Davids day on the 1st March.

The icons around the map indicate the following:-

Sailing boat is Port of Holyhead, a major sea port and a safe harbour for yachts.

Wind Turbines have replaced the windmills and are now used for renewable energy

Penmon Lighthouse -there are 5 operational lighthouses around the coast of Anglesey as the Island is quite low-lying with many sections of jagged coastline which can prove perilous to unwitting seafarers-famous shipwreck The Royal Charter in 1859.

The Island is separated from the Mainland by the Menai Strait which is spanned by two picturesque bridges-The Telford built 1826 which is depicted and The Brittania Bridge built 1850 which was rebuilt in 1980 after a fire destroyed it in 1970.

Ynys Llanddwyn is a magical place where the ruins of St Dwynwen, the patron Saint of Lovers can be seen, surrounded by Newborough Forest.
